So anyways, we meet all together at the beginning of the legislative session to talk about bills that jointly affect all of us. Or if somebody — one particular group has a bill, they can educate the rest of us about what that bill entails, what the point of it is, and see if we can support it and work out any issues that there may be prior to, you know, it going to committee and that kind of stuff.

So we did that. That was really good. And we've been able to work with the social workers, in particularly NASW, which we don't often get to work together on some things. But this one has been good. We were trying to advocate for a rate increase for Medicaid for LPC, PLPCs, and substance use treatment. So we've been working with LASACT and NASW around lobbying for this rate increase.

So to give you a little bit back story, I've been LDH, Louisiana Department of Health, for the past year. They have been tasked by the legislature to do a rate study over the course of three years. So they've --

this past year included LPC's rates, which are the 9000 codes that we bill to any insurance, but this is specific to Medicaid.

So those codes got reviewed this year. And then the next two years they review other codes. They're reviewing all the Medicaid codes, but LPC's were in this first round. So you'll see more coming out every year from the Louisiana Department of Health as they review all the codes together over the course of three years.

So we got in this first round, which was great. They, basically, said, hey, you're dismally paid, and so we need to increase that because every state around us pays more. Which is wonderful news except for the fact that the legislators did not put it in the budget to give those increases. So there is an amendment right now that we are working with the substance use LASACT related people and NASW. I actually have a meeting at 2 o'clock, which is why I have to leave today to go over what we need to do from an advocacy perspective to advocate for this amendment.

But the amendment has been

written. It looks like it will be going forward, so, you know, that's potentially positive. But the thing that's a little different about this is that Medicaid rates are housed within the state budget. So the state budget is house bill one. It's almost always the same. Every year they have to, you know, make decisions around what they're going to spend money on.

So this is going to be kind of an ongoing thing. So we got this year where we're trying to increase --

(Brief recess.)

So what the Louisiana Department of Health does when they do their rate review is they compare Louisiana rates to other states in our southern region. So they compare it to, like, Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, you know, these kind of states that are right near us. And then they take the highest rate. So for us that would be the psychologist, physician, and physician rates for behavioral health. And they compare that and then they say the rate should come up to this number. But they kind of give a range.

1 So theoretically -- and this

is -- legislators don't know anything about this unless they're a physician or, you know, a behavioral person. So most of them, this is a non -- they don't care or think about it. But, sorry, not looking at you.

But what ends up happening is that they can pick and choose. They can pick it apart and say, we're going to raise the rate here and not here. They can kind of do whatever they want because they're in charge of the budget. They could do that. They're unlikely to just because that doesn't really benefit them in any way to do that and only makes them enemies of pretty much all providers that bill Medicaid.

So it's unlikely that that would happen, but feasibly it could. So right now what we're trying to do is get that amendment through so that in can increase the rates for everyone that was in the first year, in the first round of rate increases that were subjected by LDH. LDH has already provided testimony to the budget committee. It's a joint committee between the house and the senate. And

heard in committee.

then it -- kind of once it comes out of that, goes through each the House and the Senate separately just like any other bill.

budget bill is right at this moment. I think

working with this amendment trying to get that

legislative advocacy work that we need to do
from a grass roots perspective. So I'll be
putting out information to LCA members and will
include Earnest on that as well so you all will
have that information with what we need to do
next.

So what we're meeting about today is to make sure that all the money that is in this amendment is actually going to cover us as LPCs and social workers as well. And not just the substance use treatment program that have been kind of advocating as well for their own needs. So we're trying to all work together and make sure everybody's covered.

counselors that may have a big impact. There's two bills. It's House Bill 81 and House Bill 466. So both are in the Senate education. They've been referred to the Senate education committee but have not been scheduled yet to be

So what House Bill 81 does, it would require -- these are all LGBTQ plus related bills. So you might have heard a good bit about them. But how it impacts school counselors in particular and anyone that works as a counselor in a school that does services, it would require public school employees, which would include counselors, to use certain names or pronouns for students unless parents provide a written permission to do otherwise.

So what that means for any counselor working in a school is that if a student comes to them and says, I'm struggling with being called Sean, and I want to be called Sarah, that that counselor cannot call them by that name because it's not on the birth

certificate and because they don't have parental permission.

Or if the student came and said, you know, I would like to use different pronouns than he or she, then the counselor would have to get permission from the parents in writing to use a different pronoun to address the student.

So we're not in favor of this. We're opposed to it because it would deter what we know is that a lot of students, you know, kind of express some of these gender and sexual curiosities and explorations to their school counselors and their mental health professionals that work in schools first, prior to talking to parents and talking to other adults that might be influential in their life.

So we don't think this would put school counselors or anyone that works in the school from a counseling perspective in a good place to be able to really help students. So we're opposed to that.

We are opposed to the bill in general. And we are also working on an amendment to exclude school counselors from having to follow this legislation. So if we

can't kill the bill entirely, we're trying to get an amendment to exclude any counselors that work in the schools. So to be continued. I don't know if we're going to be able to do any of those things, but that's what we're working on right now.

So there's not been any advocacy efforts requested of anybody at this point because we're really trying to target our advocacy efforts where it's needed because we have a lot of stuff going on. And if we can get an amendment or just kill the bill, then we want to pursue that route rather than kind of getting everybody involved in advocacy at this point.

So nothing's gone out about advocacy related to this house bill yet, but it probably will be.

The other one, which is House Bill 466, this is related to providing instruction and discussion in schools of sexual orientation and gender identity in K-12 schools. So, basically, prohibiting discussing things around gender identity or sexual orientation.

Again, same problem for anyone, any counselor working in the school, that this

is going to prohibit them from doing their job and being able to help students. And it will actually hurt the students that they see probably. So we are again opposed to this bill. And we are working on an amendment as well for this one. If we can't get it killed, same deal, get an exclusion for mental health professionals working in the school. So we'll see. Again, to be continued. It's the same thing for both bills.

They are both -- they both passed the House, which was unfortunate. And they're in the Senate education committee. And once there's a hearing set, we will be submitting opposition to this bill and as well advocating for that amendment if we can't get it killed in the Senate committee. So there's a lot of groups opposed to both of these bills. We are not alone. Pretty much every behavioral health provider is -- group is not on board with this, as well as a lot of educational professionals.

So we're not alone in that opposition. But it's been tough. The past few years have been a lot of LGBTQ related bills,

particularly counselors, working at mental health facilities, even if they have a concealed carry permit to be put in a position to carry at work and for it not to be safe for counselors and clients by default.

They also include security guards, which we don't have any jurisdiction over, so we don't -- that's why we're not opposed to that part. It's just the employees that would be counselors at these facilities. It's kind of an odd thing.

This bill was involuntarily deferred, meaning -- and it's in criminal justice in the House. So it's meaning that they decided in committee to defer it and not hear it the day that they scheduled it. And it was not the author's choice, it was the committee's choice to not hear it that day.

So it's my guess they're getting some push-back from other entities besides us and that they're -- the author -- they're asking the author to look at the bill and the language and make some changes and to come back later. It has not been rescheduled at this point. So we are not really worried about it until it gets

particularly around kids. So this is not new. It's just a continuation of stuff that's been going on the past couple of years.

Another bill related to -- it's House Bill 175. So this bill is around mental health facilities where -- basically, allowing people with conceal and carry -- conceal to carry gun permits to carry within a mental health facility if they're an employee or security guard at the facility.

We're opposed to the bill -- UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:

For obvious reasons.

MS. TROGDEN: It's sort of a strange thing. They're, basically, trying to include prohibiting carrying weapons into facilities -- for all healthcare facilities. But being mental health facilities, we're not included in other legislation previously done, so they're trying to pull in this mental health facilities. But the problem is they added this exclusion the employees of behavioral health -- of mental health facilities that have concealed carry permits could carry. So we're opposed to that part, where we don't want employees,

scheduled again.

So that one's kind of an odd one, but we're still watching and paying attention.

Another bill related to LGBTQ plus issues is House Bill 648. This one is -- you might have heard about it on the news. It's called The Stop Harming Our Kids Act. And, basically, it's about on the surface physicians, you know, doing things to alter the gender of minors. So it's talking a lot about physicians being able to do surgeries, procedures, or provide hormone or hormone blockers to kids under the age of 18.

So that part is not really applicable to counselors except that it goes on to talk about that it would criminally punish healthcare workers for -- and I quote -- "Validating a minor's perception of his sex if the minor's perception is inconsistent with his biological sex."

So even though the bill is not really about counseling practice, it's about medical procedures and practices, this piece where it just says any healthcare worker can be

criminally prosecuted for exploring these ideas with a minor, that that could potentially include counselors and would have far-reaching problematic issues.

So it's passed in the House. The House is a problem this year. And it's currently -- we have a better shot of dealing with it in the Senate, I'll just say that for all of these bills. The House is not friendly towards anything, basically, right now.

So it's currently pending Senate referral. So that basically means that pass the House floor, it's referring over to the Senate. The Senate has to read it a couple of times on the floor and then refer it to their committee. So we're awaiting that process and seeing what's going to happen. But we are opposed to that bill. Again, if we can't kill the bill, we'll be seeking an amendment to specifically exclude counselors from any of the bill language recently.

The physicians are all over it because it's a waste of time. To be honest, this bill is a nonissue because healthcare workers require -- are required to get caregiver

consent for any medical procedure, any medication. So it's a moot point.

But this is kind of the wave of legislation we're seeing across the country, not just Louisiana. You've probably heard a lot about it on the news. It's very concerning for -- on a larger scale, countrywide, not just in

9 MS. DOMING: I will say they 10 emailed me to confirm that you need parental 11 consent for any of this. And I did confirm that 12 we have that in our rules.

Louisiana. But these are our battles here.

MS. TROGDEN: Yeah. So it's interesting. We're seeing how things are playing out. So when I said earlier, my cryptic remark of, they're being strategic about what —they'll say files because they only have five each, this is the strategery (phonetically), so to speak, we're seeing.

There's another odd bill, which Jamie maybe can speak a little bit more on. But it's House Bill 221 that states that licensing boards for every one new rule that they make, they have to get rid of two. So that's pending the House floor. It did pass out of the House

committee, so it will go to debate on the House floor, which did not have a date when I checked yesterday when that would happen. But, basically, we're assuming that lots of other occupational licensing boards just have a lot of frivolous rules, and too many -- and pages and pages, and it gets too cumbersome, so they're wanting to scale back, you know, so write rules that are encompassing -- more encompassing, I guess, I'm not sure. That's one we're watching. Anything else to add?

MS. DOMING: I think you've just got it all. It's really a bill that they want the boards to remove two rules -- for every rule that you promulgate, you'll have to remove two. So I would imagine the intent is that they don't want more rules to continue to grow in size and become more than, you know, so many pages.

Again, I think there's going to be loop holes. You've probably heard from so many boards on this. But I imagine there's going to be loop holes combining rules.

MR. SALGADO: That's the first

thing that comes to mind, right.

MS. DOMING: It's going to be

very hard to regulate something like this if they do pass it, because boards will be able to combine rules and say this is one rule, you

4 know.

MR. RAINES: It's an attempt, I think -- their idea is probably deregulation. But at the end of the day, I don't think they're going to accomplish it the way they drafted it. If you have a viable rule over here, why do you need to get rid of two viable rules for introducing one new one? It doesn't make any logical sense to me.

MS. TROGDEN: They should

probably apply that to themselves rather than -MS. DOMING: Yeah, because
they're adding more regulations that they can't
regulate. It makes it difficult to regulate. I
shouldn't say can't. It just will make it very
difficult to regulate if they require you to do
this because now you have to analyze the new
rule to see if it includes more than one rule.

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So there's a lot of other bills going on that you might have personal vested interest in, and that's great. I always encourage people to get involved and advocate for what your personal interests are. But as LCA and representing counselors, it doesn't have -- those don't have any real impact on our scope of work as counselors. So we're just kind of watching things to see if they decide to have some scope of influence for us.

So those are the bills. Let's see. The other thing that we did this year, which we hope to grow next year, is we host a day at the Capitol where LCA members or anyone that's a counselor can -- or calls themselves a counselor as LPC, whatever, can come to the Capitol and be -- you know, participate in a day of advocacy, meet their legislators, if they

ago. So if you want more information, that's a great place to get it. Because they were the ones really pushing that advocacy. So that's exciting.

The Counseling Compact is still moving forward, so -- slowly, but surely. Jamie can probably attest to that. And so that's still in the works. I think there's 20-some odd states now?

Lastly, you may have gotten questions or you yourself got some notification about the Center for Medicaid and Medicare discontinuing the emergency COVID orders, which ended on May 12th of this year, related to providing telehealth services for mental health rehabilitation.

So we did that this year. It was really small, but it was the first time we were able to do it since COVID, so we didn't anticipate a big turnout. But next year we hope to grow it and continue that process. So you'll see if you're an LCA member in particular, you will see announcements as that gets scheduled

Couple other updates just in the government relations world in general, we did get federal leave on a Medicare bill passed allowing counselors or LPCs to be on Medicare insurance panels beginning January 1st of 2024. So counselors will credential on Medicare panels in the same exact way they credential with any other insurance company. And that will be available starting January 1st for counselors.

Counselors may get outreach from Medicare panels prior to that date to start the credentialing process. But it officially goes into effect January 1st. So ACA, American Counseling Association, has been putting out some information and did a webinar not too long

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So that emergency order ran out, in essence, on May 12th allowing MHR programs to do telehealth. And so currently they should not technically be allowed to do telehealth.

The Louisiana Department of Health has requested from CMS an extension to that, but have not got an answer and probably won't get an answer until mid June. So this applies to all MHR services, which is CPST and PSR billing codes, and this comes from federal CMS. This is nothing that we can really push or do anything about honestly.

And I was sharing with others earlier. My perception of CMS' standpoint is that MHR services are meant to be in the home and community. So if you can't go to the home community and you need to do telehealth, then you don't need MHR services. You can go through, you know, regular counseling services.
